



## The Great Storm!

Let me take you back to 1987 when there were just 7 Oak trees standing tall in Seven oaks and they had been standing for hundreds of years. On the night of the 15th October 1987 there were winds like no one had ever felt before in Sevenoaks but people weren't worried as the weather forecaster, Michael Fish, had reported there was nothing to worry about. He was wrong because a hurricane was on its way later to be known as The Great Storm. When people awoke in the morning, there was devastation all around. 15 million Otrees had been uprooted from the ground although in Seven oaks one tree remained standing. If you look outside you can see the King Oak standing proudly still today. Homes and schools were wrecked and roads and railways were blocked. If you were alive at the time, you might remember 1 out of every 3 houses was damaged. Because phone lines and televisions were ruined, people didn't know how badly the storm had swept the south of England. Since the catastrophe, the people of Seven oaks replanted the 7 Oaks to commemorate the Great Storm and the 18 lives that were lost that included 2 firefighters.
